MEETING MINUTES
September 22, 2008

- I. Introductions and changes to the agenda- Anthony Graves will also speak about the landfill plume. The presentation for watershed protection by the open space council is cancelled. It is brought to our attention by the D.E.C. that there is another invasive species, Hydrilla to look out for.
- II. Update from the Town of Brookhaven – Anthony Graves
 - A. Harvester update: Graves informs us that the town has bought a harvester and there are plans to use it on the lower lake on dense patches of Cabomba and Variable leaf milfoil. The town has applied for three permits and is just waiting on permission from the county to operate in their 20% of the lake. There is a concern with using the harvester because of the nature of the plant breaking and growing from the smaller pieces. To help solve this problem, a screen will be put in place along the outlet when the harvester is in use and a few hours after. The screen will be cleared hourly to rid any blockage by plant material. The goal is to start harvesting as soon as the permits are completed, sometime this fall. The best time to harvest is in the spring when invasive species are present but before the native plants grow back so there are plans to do it again in the spring as well. The plant material will be collected and brought to the landfill to be

composted. This year the harvester will be concentrating only on lower lake and the machinery will be operated by the highway department. Although this was a possibility for treatment in the RFP, there is no need to go back and change the RFP because this is not a long term solution.

- B. Landfill plume: There is a known leachate plume from the Brookhaven Town landfill in Beaver Dam Creek and Little Neck Run. This is important to us because Little Neck Run is near to the doorway of Carmans River and this plume could effect the whole river ecosystem. It looks like the trout are pretty much gone from this area because of the depleting water quality. Not all of the damage was done by the landfill; there were sewage impacts as well. Keper's office is to have a meeting on this on Friday and more will be discussed.
- C. Stormwater Runoff – the town is working with the highway department concerning the runoff affecting the Yaphank lakes and Carmans River. The town grant (which is separate from the county grant) applied for covers any part of the implementation process of the project. The Grant is flexible and is also to be used on other parts of the water system.

III. Update from Suffolk County – Camilo Salazar

- A. Storm Water Remediation Program - Salazar informs us that the CR21 concerning the four county owned outfalls that influence the lakes is in planning. The goal is to identify major pollutants, and determine the flow rate. They also aim to estimate the benefits and construction costs. This project is a priority and will definitely be discussed at the next meeting, this Thursday.

* The committee agrees that we should send a letter from the Carmans river working group urging the importance of this issue. This was motioned by Adrienne and seconded by Marty Van Lith. All were unanimously in favor. Camilo will stay on top of this issue and keep us updated as to whether it was recommended to be passed onto the environmental committee on Thursday. If it passes through, members should call or write to Schniederman pressing remediation.

- B. RFP – is in final provisions by Jenny in the legal department and it is to be advertised on October 2nd for public comments. There will be a meeting for the public to ask questions on October 16th. The conference will be Oct 30th, where bids for work will be placed. All proposals will be due in by November 20th. There is a plan to have a final decision by December and to assign the project in January. The RFP committee will consist of 6-10 people including Camilo, the services department and the water quality department. The working group had originally aimed to take action in the spring when the prime time for eradication is, but it is unlikely and ambitious. The feasibility study will cost about \$200,000 and the pilot project will cost about \$50,000. The results from the study will be public.

The county will favor any contractor with local experience or experience with the invasive species we are dealing with.

IV. Next meeting

- A. We will be having a voluntary meeting on Monday November 20th at BP Cottage from 7:30-10 PM to listen to Steven Moyers, from Trout Unlimited. Our next official meeting will be on November 18th, 7PM at Brookhaven Town Hall.
- B. At our next meeting we need to keep working on the drainage issue and the fish passages. The watershed presentation will be rescheduled for this meeting.
